



Predicted Red Wave

“ Republican leaders in the House and Senate are already clamoring for credit in anticipation of gaining seats in Tuesday night’s midterms, with several eyeing a potential GOP wave as a launch pad for their own political ambitions.” – AXIOS, November 7th, 2022

Red Ripple, Not Wave

- Trump states went Republican and Biden states went Democratic in Senate
- Strong turnout for midterm: 46.9%
- Florida and New York showed ‘red wave’ was possible
- Michigan and Pennsylvania showed Democratic strength
- Not a “change” election
- Mainstream polling mostly got it right
- Decoupling: Biden’s poll numbers not indicative of voting behavior

- Democrats will keep control of the Senate in the 2022 midterm elections, NBC News projected.
- The party will hold at least 50 seats after Sens. Mark Kelly of Arizona and Catherine Cortez Masto of Nevada held off challenges.
- Lt. Gov. John Fetterman of Pennsylvania also flipped the state's GOP-held seat, NBC projected.
- The GOP tried to leverage economic volatility and public discontent in their bid to win a majority in the chamber.

The Big Issues

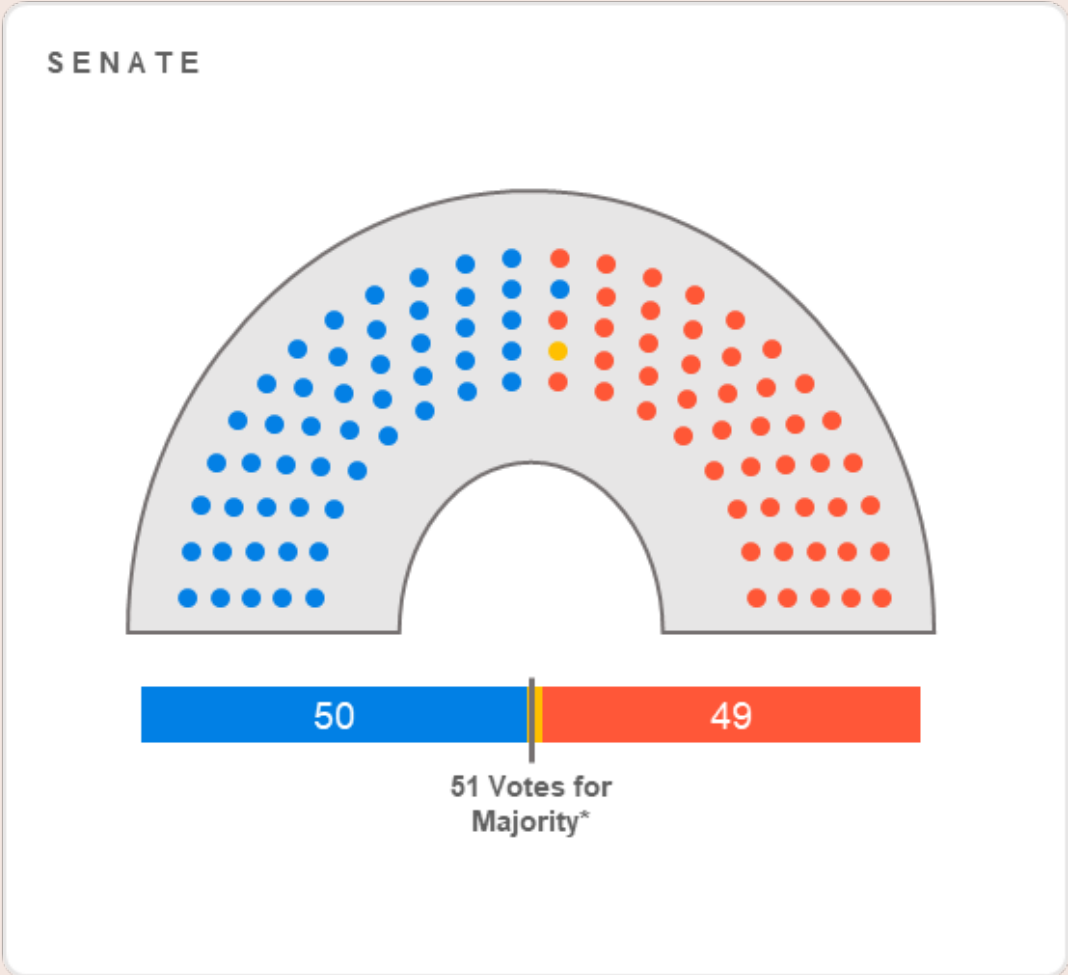
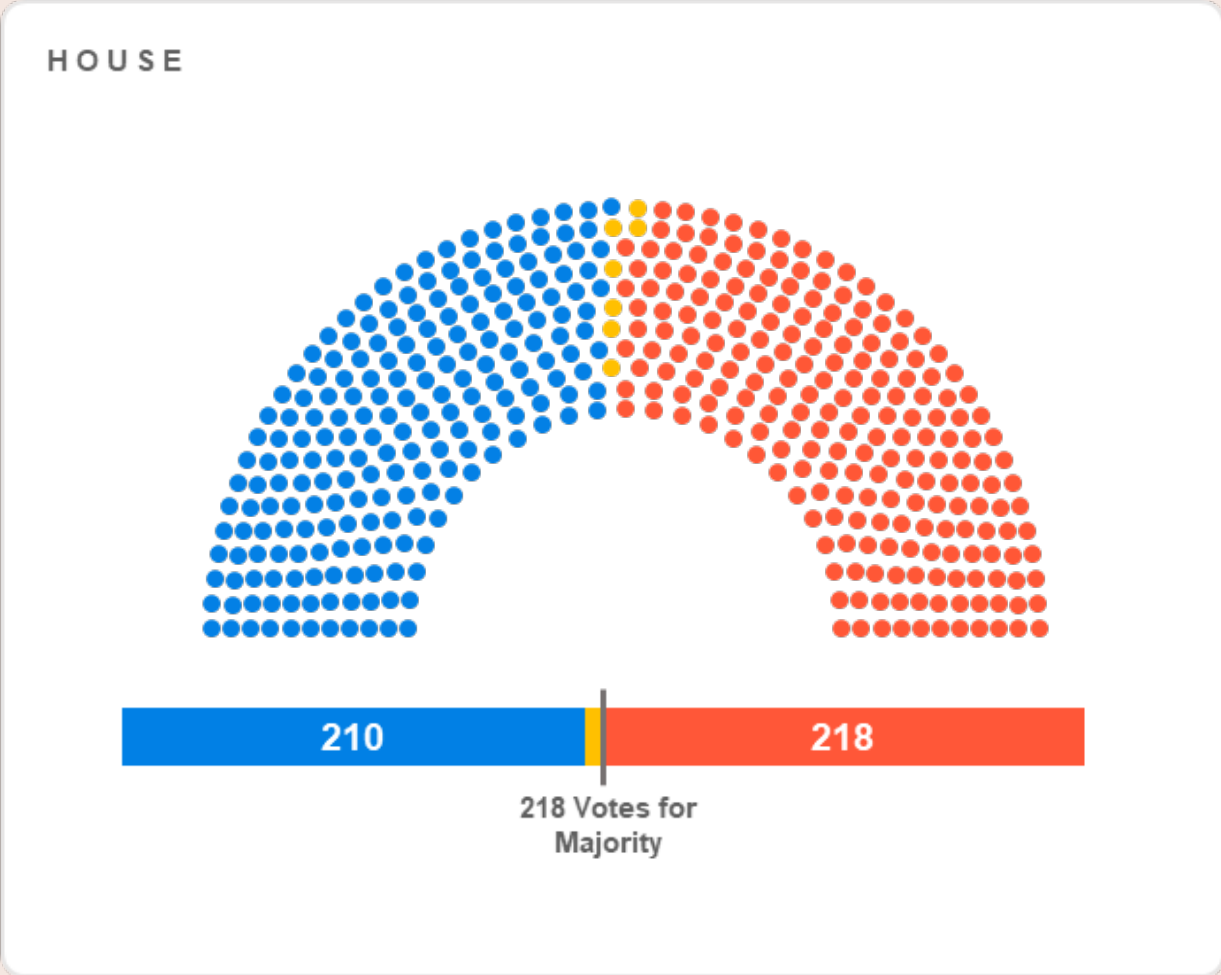
- 1 Abortion remained a large issue for voters through election day.

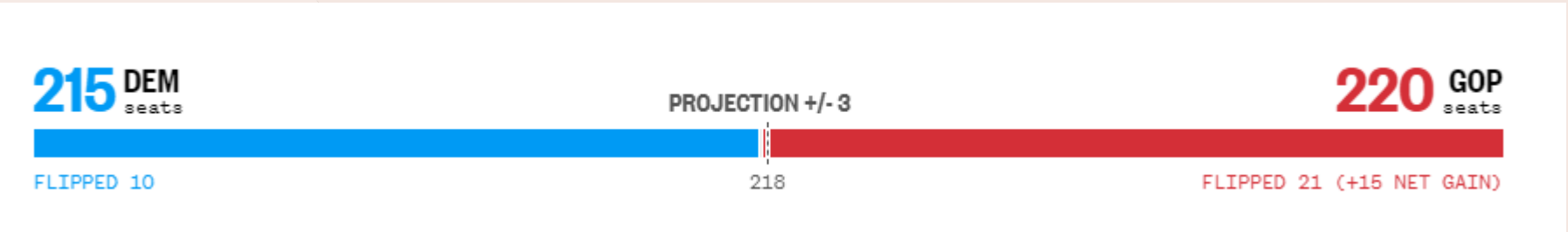
